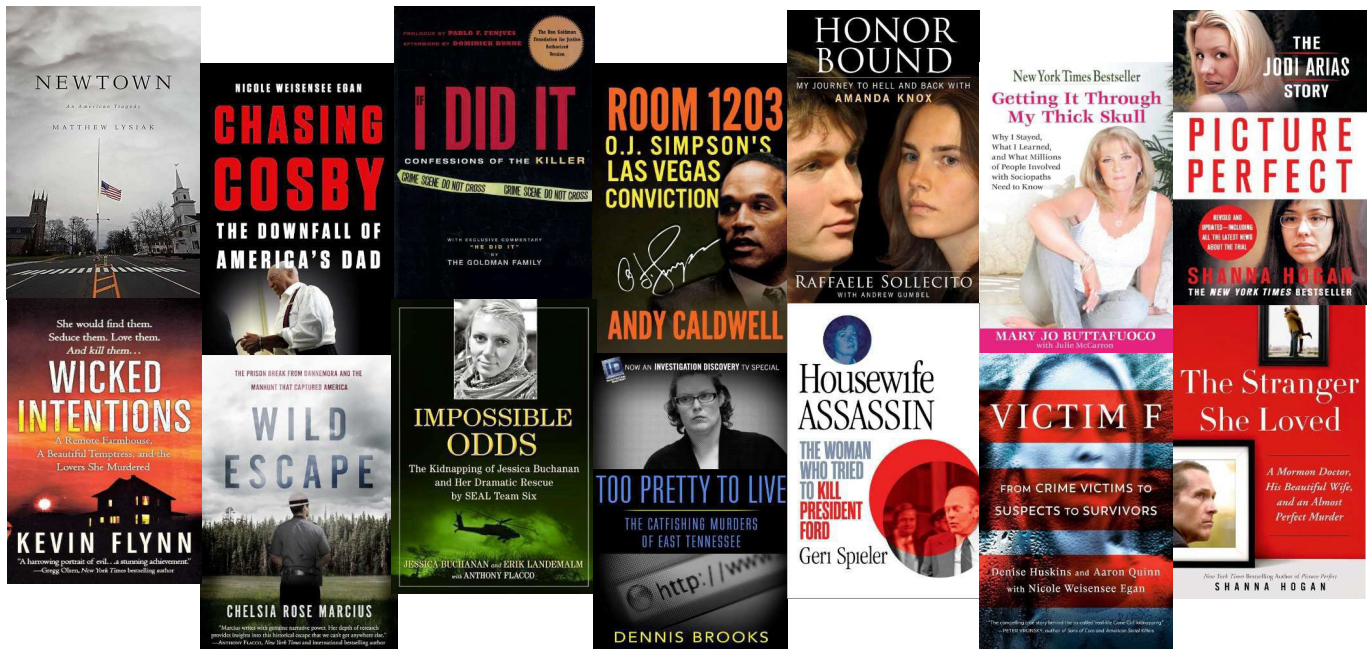

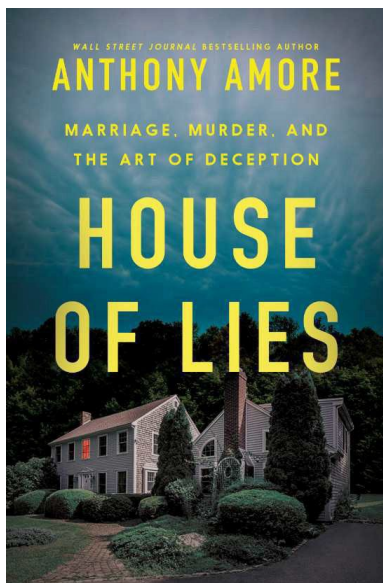

HOUSE OF LIES

Ana Walshe, a successful real estate executive and mother of three, vanished from her home in the wealthy suburb of Cohasset, Massachusetts, the case captivated the nation. Within days, suspicion fell on her husband Brian Walshe -a man already under federal indictment for selling forged Warhols, and whose life, it turned out, was a masterclass in deception.

In *House of Lies: Marriage, Murder, and the Art of Deception*, best-selling author and art crime expert Anthony Amore traces Walshe's descent from elite con artist to convicted killer, exposing the disturbing psychological throughline that connects art fraud and uxoricide. Blending true crime, psychological insight, and investigative rigor, this is the definitive account of a chilling modern-day tragedy.

Hundreds of thousands of social media detectives began examining what they could of Ana's life. Her Instagram account provided perhaps the best glimpse. Petite and very well dressed, she seemed to embody the perfect life. There were photos of her on airplanes sporting a large diamond; pictures of her three handsome sons, all under six years old and impeccably dressed; a photo of her in a bikini, proudly belying her recent pregnancies; scenes from fine dining; and lots of selfies (one person described them as "thirsty").

Within days, Cohasset Police charged Brian with deliberately misleading investigators when they found that the timeline of his actions he provided was far from truthful. There was more: a broken knife and evidence of blood were found in the basement. And when detectives looked at the internet history on his six-year old son's iPad, they found searches for instructions on dismembering and disposing of a 115-pound body-Ana's exact weight. In the days that followed, investigators would uncover a mountain of ominous circumstantial evidence that pointed towards murder and Brian as the culprit.

Brian's earlier conviction for art fraud tells the tale of a dangerously anti-social individual, one with seemingly no conscience and a lust for vast sums of money at the expense of others. He not only had conned friends out of hundreds of thousands of dollars, but he had also pilfered a million dollars from his late father both before and after his death. His art crime of selling forged Warhols provides just a glimpse into the actions of a sociopath who smiled as he was led from the courthouse when facts were aired that pointed blame at his wife's vanishing squarely on him.

Told with the unique perspective of an expert in art-related crime, *House of Lies* will paint a portrait of Brian Walshe and the path he took from art scams to the most heinous of crimes: the murder of the mother of his children. It will tell of the parallels between the two acts and provide a glimpse into the chaotic world of status-seeking while displaying the profile of a sociopath that ultimately cost a young woman and mother her life.

In December 2025, Judge Diane Freniere called Brian Walshe's crimes "barbaric and incomprehensible" and she chastised him for "deceitful and manipulative behavior" and sentenced him to life without parole.

House of Lies: Marriage, Murder, and the Art of Deception by Anthony M. Amore (Pegasus Crime/Simon & Schuster, Winter 2027) I highlighted this story when it first broke exactly two years ago. At the time, there was a lot of circumstantial evidence suggesting that Brian Walshe was responsible for killing his wife, Ana. The one hurdle was that there was no body. Now, two years later, Walshe was just convicted of murdering Ana and sentenced to life without parole. There are a lot of people scrambling to make a doc, which is a no-brainer. But this book-long examination of the case proves why it would make a compelling movie/limited series.

This in-the-works book from Amore, a DHS official-turned-author, would be a strong underlying IP for an adaptation. Amore is an art theft expert — he's currently head of security at the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum, working to recover the 13 master-pieces stolen 35 years ago. He also worked on post-9/11 terrorism cases for DHS. He's written best-selling books on stolen Rembrandts and on the notorious theft of the only privately owned Vermeer (which is being developed as a limited series). He's also been following this case longer than most, having started when Walshe was earlier charged with art forgery. He followed the trial from the courtroom and wrote about it extensively on Substack. The book just sold to Pegasus and won't be published for a year, but the screen rights are being shopped as we speak.

Walshe was a privileged ne'er-do-well who built his life on fraud and cons, including bilking his own dad of half a million dollars. When Ana disappeared, he was awaiting sentencing on federal charges for scamming an L.A. couple out of \$80K by selling them a pair of fake Warhols. Initially, Walshe's ability to pull off these scams stemmed from his confidence and polish. He knew how to talk to people, move in wealthy circles and look like he belonged. But he would also become sloppy. His fakes weren't polished and the scams couldn't withstand serious scrutiny.

Ana was the opposite, a classic immigrant striver who had come to the U.S. from Serbia and who'd worked her way up from the bottom of the hospitality business to a high-powered job at Tishman Speyer. Her 2023 disappearance was only discovered when her employer reported that she didn't show up for work in Washington, D.C. (Ana commuted between the capital and the couple's home in a wealthy Boston suburb). Brian claimed that Ana left for Washington, D.C. on New Year's Day and wasn't all that concerned that he hadn't heard from her.

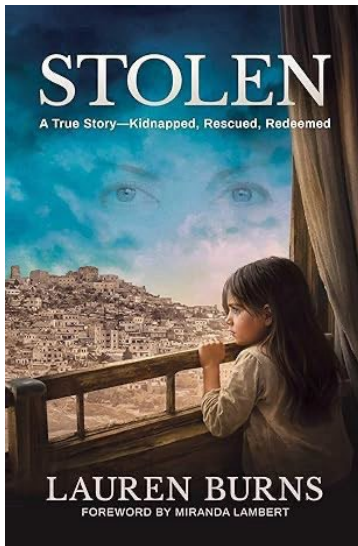
His story quickly fell apart. Especially after police discovered damning Google searches on his child's iPad for "Best way to dispose of a body," "Better to throw away crime scene clothes or wash them" and "Can you be charged with murder without a body." Just before trial, Walshe floated the cockamamie story that Ana had died of natural causes and that he simply cut up and disposed of the body out of fear that no one would believe he wasn't responsible for her death.

Amore's book promises to go deep on both Walshe and the murder. Roughly half of it follows Brian and Ana's early life—his screwed-up childhood, her move to the States, their meeting and courtship, his Warhol scam, how he plundered his father's estate after his 2018 death. The second half is a detailed account of the investigation, from her disappearance to his recent conviction. Amore links the art fraud with the murder, noting that Walshe shared "the same anti-social tendencies as the major art fraudsters of recent years: an overabundance of hubris combined with a sloppiness borne of an inflated self-confidence. It's a trend in forgery scandals, and a trend we will see later in Walshe's greatest crime."

This is a smart take. It's also why I think this would be a good underlying IP for a TV movie or a limited series. Walshe is the kind of central character who's hard to like and even harder to ignore. He's a real-life Tom Ripley. Meanwhile, Ana is his sympathetic victim — the one who gets you to shout at the TV: "Get out while you can!"

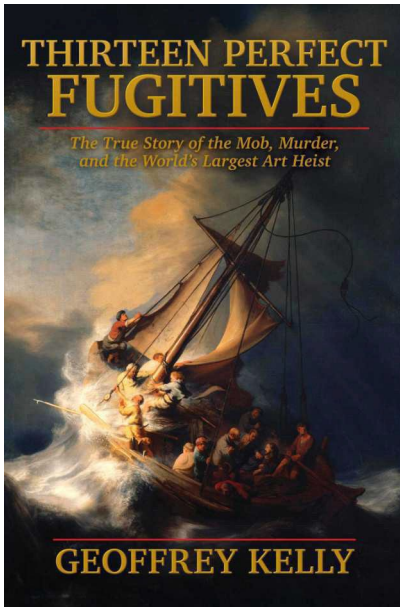

Thirteen Perfect Fugitives

On March 18, 1990, the world's largest art heist occurred. We're aware there have been a few books written about this robbery years ago, but most of them got it wrong. And none has been authored (with written approval by the FBI) by the FBI's longest-tenured case agent assigned to the Art Crime Division investigation who solved the theft. As St. Patrick's Day festivities were winding down in Boston, thirteen pieces of artwork were plucked from the walls of the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum by two subjects posing as police officers. They rang the night bell, claiming they were responding to a call of a disturbance. The guard on duty, against protocol, let them in. As the author writes, "not since some Trojan night watchman signed for the big wooden horse has a greater lapse in security led to such dire consequences."

After incapacitating the guards with handcuffs and duct tape, the subjects spent the next eighty-one minutes inside the museum, almost leisurely removing some of the world's most valuable pieces of artwork from the walls, including a rare Vermeer and Rembrandt's only known seascape. The total loss associated with this robbery has been estimated at over ONE BILLION Dollars.

Geoffrey Kelly was the lead investigator, right up until his recent retirement from the FBI. During that time, he traveled the world, running down leads in his sometimes-Quixotic effort to find the stolen artwork. He has dined with fine art collectors, appraisers, and museum directors. He has also dined with mobsters, thieves, and killers. It was through his associations with the latter group, those denizens of a seamy and nefarious underworld, where he made the most progress on the case. In 2009, the author received a break; information which corroborated previously established theories about the heist and the individuals responsible. For the first time since the robbery occurred, the author spoke to witnesses with first-hand knowledge of the crime and, more importantly, witnesses who had actually seen the artwork with their own eyes in the years since it was stolen from the museum. The author followed the trail of the artwork, eventually led him to an aging used-car salesman from Hartford, Connecticut named Bobby "The Cook" Gentile.

In addition to selling cars, the enigmatic Gentile was also a soldier in the Philadelphia mob who trafficked narcotics and built homemade silencers. Relentless investigation by the author determined that Gentile took possession of a number of the stolen paintings in or about 2002 from an associate of Carmello "Mello" Merlino, a Boston mobster referred to by the FBI as a "person of interest" in the heist. Merlino and his crew operated a drug trafficking operation out of an auto parts storefront in Boston. One of his associates, George Reissfelder, drove a Dodge that was identical to the one driven by the robbers to the museum that night. Six weeks later, a family member helped him hang one of the stolen paintings on his bedroom wall. Less than a year later, Reissfelder was found dead under suspicious circumstances. And two weeks later so was Lenny DiMuzio, another Merlino associate whose bullet-riddled body was discovered in the trunk of his car in East Boston. Readers will learn that another Merlino associate, Bobby Donati, once tried to sell one of the stolen Gardner items to a Boston jeweler six weeks after the heist; the dealer demurred because the piece was "too hot." That September, Donati also ended up the trunk of his car, beaten and stabbed to death. And their associate Jimmy Marks, who was bragging months after the heist that he had two of the stolen paintings hidden in his apartment, was gunned down in February on his front porch in a "classic mob-style hit." 1991 was certainly a busy year for the Gardner. These are details that have not become well known and keep the suspense of this true crime moving throughout the book.

Based on the author's meticulous investigation, conducted to the exacting standards required of an FBI special agent, the Bureau, in conjunction with the Boston U.S. Attorney's Office and the Gardner Museum, announced that the case had finally been solved. Although the paintings have yet to be recovered, the FBI finally knew who had committed the robbery. The story of 13 Perfect Fugitives is a first-person account, including extensive interviews with mobsters, witnesses, victims, informants, and family members. This book painstakingly details the author's twenty-two-year journey to find the world's most valuable stolen artwork, providing insight and hopefully a little humor along the way. The author has always thought of the missing objects as Thirteen perfect fugitives. Instead, they hide, secreted far away prying eyes and nosy FBI agents, biding their time.

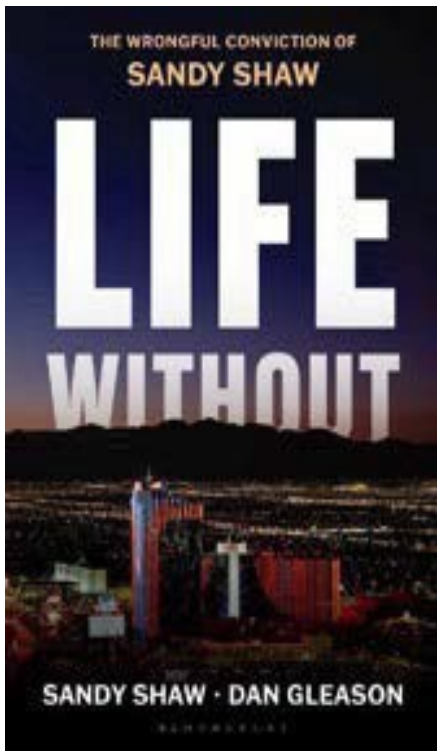
The daring and brazen 1990 robbery of the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum has long fascinated Bostonians like me, who grew up in its wake. But it has also captivated true-crime aficionados beyond the 617 area code. It's spawned documentaries, podcasts, novels and true-crime books. But none have told the tale from the perspective of the longest-tenured FBI investigator in the case, Geoffrey J. Kelly, who finally shares his story. A quick recap: On Sunday, March 18, 1990, just a day after the heavily Irish city celebrated St. Patrick's Day, two people posing as cops gained entry to the museum. They tied up the guards and stole 13 major artworks, including a rare Vermeer and the only seascape that Rembrandt ever painted. The value of their haul in today's market: \$1 billion. It immediately became the most famous unsolved art theft in world. The big break in the case finally came in 2009, when the FBI arrested used-car salesman and alleged mobster Robert "The Cook" Gentile on firearm charges. Gentile, who was already a person of interest in the Isabella Stewart Gardner heist, led them to Carmello "Mello" Merlino, a mobster who operated a drug trafficking operation out of an auto parts storefront in Boston. That led them to the pair's associates, who were likely involved in the crime and who all died mysteriously soon after. Nobody was ever officially convicted in the case, but in 2013, with all the key suspects dead at that point (Gentile died in 1999, Merlino in 2005), the FBI declared that the case had been solved. The paintings still haven't been recovered.

The proposal begins with the robbery, skips ahead to Gentile's arrest, and then doubles back to map all of the twists and turns along the way. Kelly ends with the case being "solved," convinced that the art will eventually be recovered. But in the meantime, he says the notion that this was "the perfect crime" simply isn't true. The artwork isn't actually worth that \$1 billion figure; it's not worth anything because the thieves will never be able to offload treasures this hot. To be a perfect crime, the criminals need to be able to enjoy the spoils of their ill-gotten gains, right?

Kelly does a great job of bringing his own perspective to the case, but he also interviews cops, investigators and mobsters and lets them air their opinions. This might be Kelly's first book, but he shows a great eye for character (as you might expect from a seasoned detective) and a born raconteur's knack for storytelling. This is a fresh -and welcome -take on the case.

Kelly's career, though, goes much deeper than just the Isabella Stewart Gardner case. He's investigated everything from Tom Brady's stolen Super Bowl jersey to the unidentified "Lady of the Dunes" murder to finding and returning 22 Okinawan treasures missing since WWII. Another one of his cases, which involved a string of armored car heists, was the basis for Ben Affleck's *The Town*, with Jon Hamm playing a fictionalized version of the author. After hanging up his badge and retiring earlier this year, Kelly founded Argus Cultural Property Consultants, a firm that is fittingly dedicated to helping people protect valuable art.

So how to adapt this? Well, there's a couple of possibilities. The first is a movie that revolves around Kelly. It would be a cerebral procedural about a dogged, shrewd investigator. Hamm again? I'd buy that. Still, Kelly's entire career is so fascinating someone might consider turning it into a series about the head of Boston's FBI office getting handed case files that range from the weird (Super Bowl jerseys) to the notorious (Lady of the Dunes) to the unsolvable (the Gardner theft). I would structure it with the Gardner theft as the central, multi-season mystery and pepper it with some smaller, solved-in-one-episode crimes. In fact, I think this approach would be especially fitting for today's shorter-season world in which some procedurals (Bosch, *The Lincoln Lawyer*, etc.) are better at 10-ish episodes than they would be at the 20-ish of a network.

The Wrongful Conviction of Sandy Shaw

How many fifteen-year-old girls have witnessed four murders? Well, Sandy Shaw wishes she wasn't in that group. In 1987, when Sandy heard the bark of the first pistol shot right next to her ear, she bolted and ran for her life.

Touted as the “**Show & Tell Killer**” by the media because a crooked prosecutor told the press and jury she took classmates to view the dead body, Sandy was immediately maligned by the press. She was convicted and sentenced to **two life terms without parole** and became the **youngest female ever incarcerated in an adult Nevada prison**. 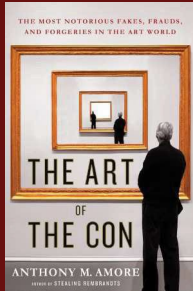

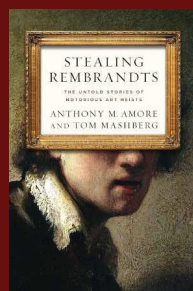

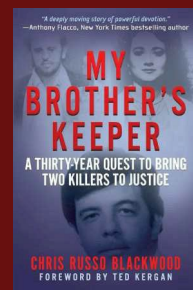

They involve stolen art hidden for decades; elaborate ruses that involve the Nazis and allegedly plundered art; the theft of a conceptual prototype from a well-known artist by his assistant to be used later to create copies; the use of online and television auction sites to scam buyers out of millions; and other confidence scams incredible not only for their boldness but more so because they actually worked. Using interviews and newly released court documents, The Art of the Con will also take the reader into the investigations that led to the capture of the con men, who oftentimes return back to the world of crime. For some, it's an irresistible urge because their innocent dupes all share something in common: they want to believe.



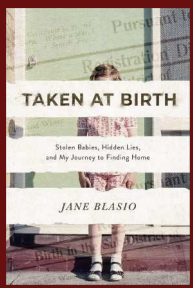

Elizabeth spent a lot of time in funeral homes as a kid, not because her family was in the business, but because they were so frequently found in caskets. Her mother died when she was young; so did her grandparents. Elizabeth began to read about different cultures' death rituals in National Geographic magazine. She held a mock cemetery on her dresser, and when friends' pets died, she would perform the funeral.

Elizabeth stood out at her tiny suburban Catholic school and knew it. After her mother's death and the loss of her fond attentions, Elizabeth performed dance routines for anyone she could press into watching. Her family's garage was the scene of many elaborate recitals. The dancing put joy back in her life but did nothing to assuage her sense of wrongness. Grief had hurt Elizabeth in ways she couldn't put into words. Elizabeth felt starved for reassurance, and without it, an inner voice began to chant that she was pathetic. She wanted to crawl into a tire swing and die.

Elizabeth realized her life calling when she was offered the chance to be a live-in night keeper at a funeral home on a big hill. For Elizabeth, it was a casting call from Hollywood. She took the job and slept in a trailer on the spooky edge of the cemetery, with a shotgun under her bed. It was the scariest summer of her life, but it set things in motion. Elizabeth continued learning the ropes in the funeral world while living in the San Francisco Bay area, but her biological clock was ticking louder by the month while her dating life stalled at Dysfunction Junction. A move back to Oregon proved fruitful; in a mortuary version of romance, she found her husband after descending into the bowels of the corporate funeral home where they both were employed. (He worked there as a cremator). They soon married and together broke free from the corporate funeral home world and headed off to tiny Boring, Oregon, to make a fledgling country funeral home their own. Daughter, Sofia (named after the Catholic Patron Saint of Widows) arrived the following year and Elizabeth brought her to the parlor every day. Sofia soon taught her that by lying in a grief-stricken widow's arms for a moment, and she could help the tension ease a bit. The baby held a natural gift of comforting the bereaved.

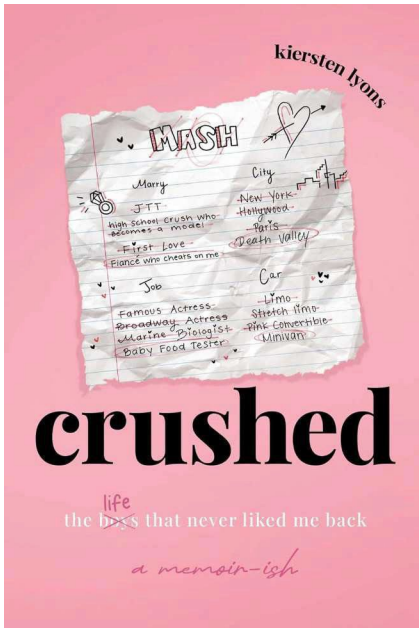
At the start of Elizabeth's career, it was truly an anomaly to walk into a funeral home and be greeted by a woman. Now Elizabeth runs a one-woman funeral service in the small town of Boring, a semi-rural community just outside of Portland. Elizabeth is the owner and operator of Cornerstone Funeral Services, the first green funeral home in the Portland Metropolitan area. She works as a green mortician and eco-educator and is affectionately known as the Green Reaper because of her passion of home funerals and natural burials. Elizabeth is always ready to lend a hand (or a shovel) and she is renowned for burying her townsfolk in their backyards.

Her story weaves anecdotes linked by her "Green Reaper" philosophy of eschewing big profits and instead returning to old-school burial practices that are far kinder to humans and the Earth. Through these experiences, she continues to reach more of her own healing and to reestablish inner connections. Some of us work for a better life; Elizabeth works for a better death.

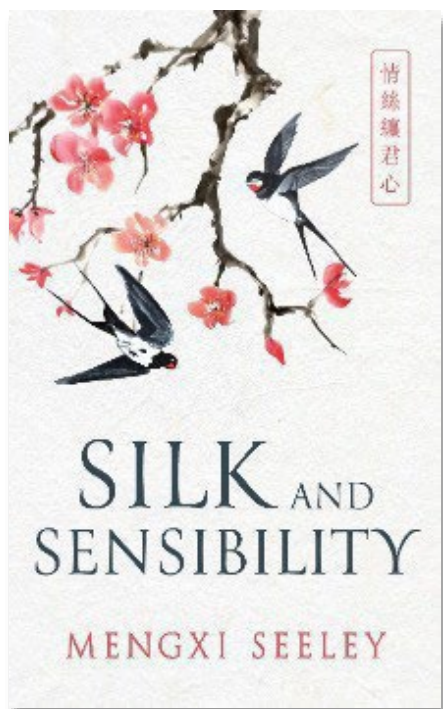


SILK AND SENSIBILITY

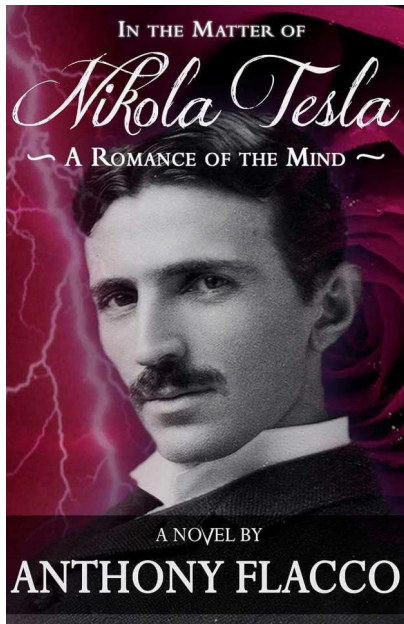

NIKOLA TESLA

A Romance of the Mind

This proposed six part limited dramatic historical series is told through the POV of mega-rich financier JP MORGAN in following the life of the brilliant inventor Nikola Tesla. It is told through the eyes of those who work with him, work against him, spy on him, believe in him, and betray him.

The story follows a five-year timeline from 1899 to 1904. For Morgan, the Great Question is simple: what drives this revolutionary scientific genius -- and does the answer threaten Morgan's empire?

WHY J.P. MORGAN?

These six episodes are told principally from Morgan's POV because he is the reason for the failure of Tesla's plan for Universal Free Energy. Morgan is the source of the blackball put on Tesla by Wall St. investors. Plainly put, J.P. Morgan single-handedly destroyed the career of Nikola Tesla.

But as the story will show, he had no other choice, given the information he possessed. Tesla wasn't dangerous because he was wrong; he was dangerous because he was right. If Morgan hadn't stopped Tesla, then for better or worse, there is no doubt the world would be much different today. And in Morgan's view that meant disaster, either from Tesla himself or from the people given his machines and tearing up the planet with their carelessness.

J.P. Morgan's museum-quality office is the lair of the 19th Century Alpha Male, with oversized Victorian furniture calculated to impress, intimidate. There he pulls in other people (Mark Twain, George Westinghouse, Tesla assistant George Scherff) to ask about Tesla and get their perception of the man. Morgan has massive investments at stake, perhaps entire industries, and he has to know whether or not to continue backing Tesla's experiments or cut him off and leave him dry. The stories these men tell are played out in Morgan's visionary imagination, while none of them agree on who this strange man is.

Each time one of them begins talking about Tesla, the narrative begins as seen from their POV, however the POV quickly switches to that of J.P. Morgan, while he visualizes what he is being told. HIS version never makes the speaker or the subject look very good. Everybody in Morgan's POV is always noticeably more unkempt in appearance and slow of speech.

HERE'S SHOW THE POV CHANGES ARE USED:

Author Mark Twain looks at Tesla and sees a beautiful genius doomed to be derailed by human stupidity. Tesla plays out exactly that way in Twain's POV.

But while Morgan listens to the famous author, the narrative switches to his POV and shows a decadent writer of trivial popular novels who is speaking up for a dangerously eccentric inventor.

George Westinghouse tells Morgan about his associations with Tesla. In financing the Niagara Falls power system for Tesla, using Morgan's money, he has come to see Tesla as an inventive man. But he sees Tesla's naivety as proving his genius to be overrated.

Of course, while Morgan listens, the narrative shifts to his POV and reveals that he regards Westinghouse as an uncultured “lucky winner” in business. In Morgan’s POV, Westinghouse is a rather unintelligent bore who can barely keep Tesla listening to him when he speaks. Morgan dismisses the worth of his responses, lights a cigar, and begins to sing an idle tune under his breath while Westinghouse drones on.

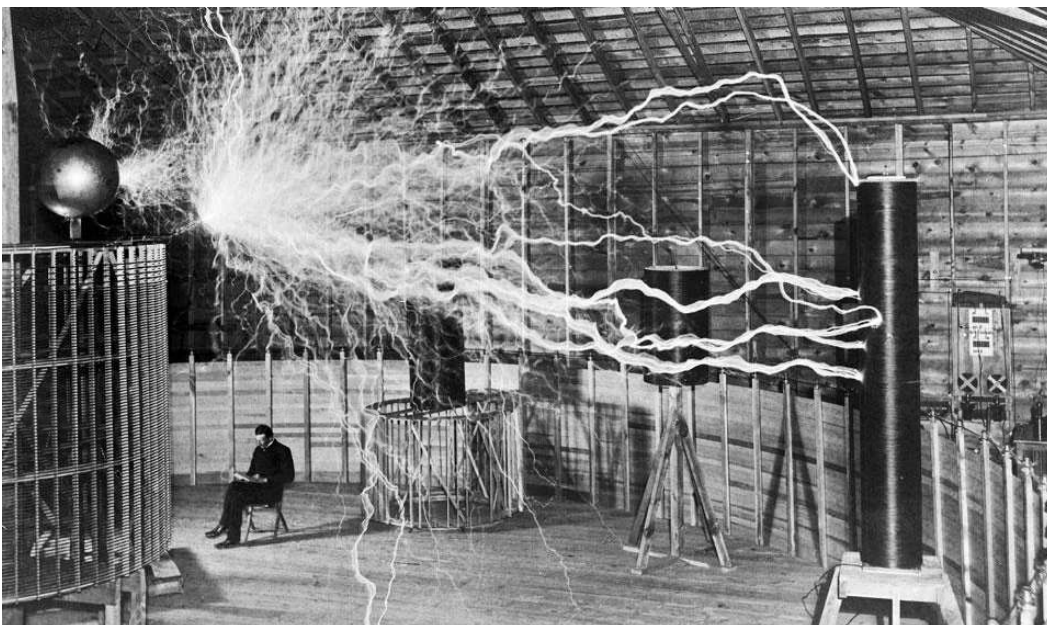
As for George Scherff, Tesla’s long-term assistant is so kind in his version of Tesla that Morgan accuses him of covering up for his boss. But Scherff persists in telling of a solitary genius who lives most of his life inside his head, where he entertains a “muse” who may be invisible, but who is real to him.

Scherff insists Tesla’s motives are pure. His POV shows Tesla as a passionate romantic with a vivid personal imagination. Scherff tells how he sometimes watches Tesla’s revels from the shadows, a guilty voyeur filled with admiration.

But while Morgan listens, his POV overlaps Scherff’s, and now both Scherff and Tesla come across as “a fool and his servant,” sloppily attired and slower of speech. Morgan sees what the genius cannot: the proposed World Power System would concentrate all broadcasting of electrical power as well as all forms of information to a handful of Tesla Towers around the globe. The commercial and military challenges to seize control of them would never end.

In this way we come to understand why the great J. Pierpont Morgan, more financially powerful than the United States government, will see to it that this man must be stopped. The fact that Nikola Tesla has already conceived, designed, and installed the first electrical generators at Niagara Falls doesn’t speak in his favor-- it proves he must be stopped. And so, although the Niagara Falls power station is a model for the world’s emerging power grid, Tesla will die in 1943 too poor to pay his own light bill.

According to J.P. Morgan, civilization dodged a bullet.

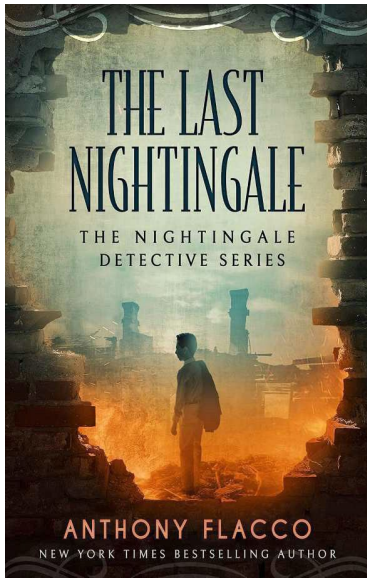

The Brindles have become busy creatures: Felix and Beatrice work constantly, three of their children put the extra in extra curriculars, and Ernest, their reclusive, guarded twelve-year-old, goes off alone to read his collection of Oxford English Dictionaries. The least they could do was remember OLIVETTI once in a while, since he remembers every single word they've typed on him. It's a thankless job, keeping memories alive. OLIVETTI gets a rare glimpse of action from Beatrice, his used-to-be most frequent visitor—only for her to drop him off at Heartland Pawn Shop and leave him helplessly behind. It isn't until Ernest spots him in the shop window that OLIVETTI learns **Beatrice has mysteriously gone missing**. OLIVETTI believes he can help find her and prove he's more than just some pawn. He breaks the only rule of his 'kind' and **types back to Ernest, divulging Beatrice's memories stored inside him**.

Their search takes them across **San Francisco—typing on toilet seats, dodging a dumpster-diving girl, and sure, committing a few minor felonies**. As OLIVETTI spills out the past, Ernest is forced to face what **he and his family have been running from The Everything That Happened**. But when snoopy Jasper, aka **Wick**, discovers he's a fictional character (big oops) and tears Rigby's copy of the book in half, he inadvertently stops time in the story-world and attracts the attention of the interdimensional **Vices**, a book-burning motorcycle gang of Deadly Sins obsessed with eradicating happy endings. With the unlikely help of **Wick** (and her goody-two-shoes fictional crush, **Chance Golden**), Rigby must return to the real world, seek a mysterious librarian called the **Bookbinder**, and repair the book before the Vices destroy the story-world—and Rigby's last chance at a grand adventure—forever

Jessie's debut is narrated by the self-aware voice of the book itself (similar to the narration style of *The Book Thief* and *A Series of Unfortunate Events*). It's A NEVERENDING STORY for this generation.

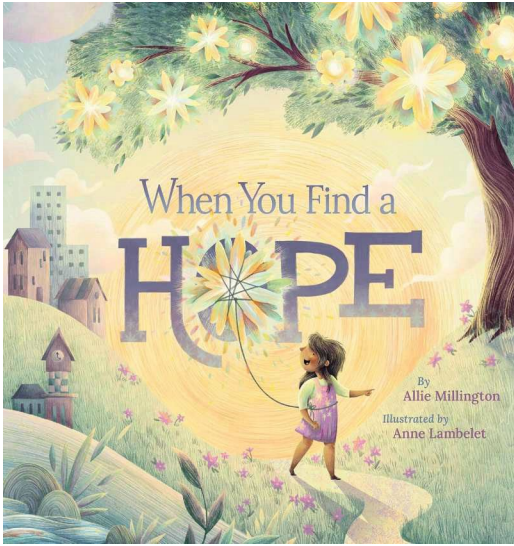

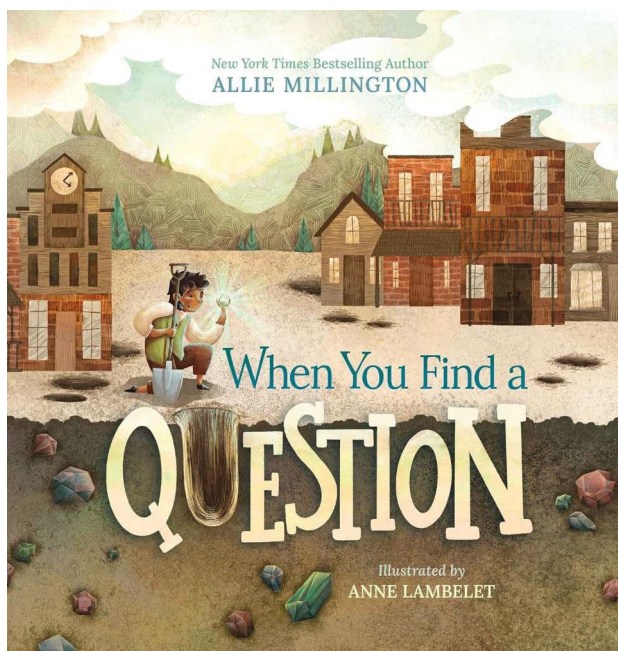
